Meeting Summary

Hazard Mitigation Plan Presentation

The meeting began with a presentation from the planning team. The presentation included progress updates and a review of the online public survey results (see attached slides). The participants reviewed problem statements that were developed using the results of the risk assessment as well as a hazard matrix to visualize how various hazards compare in terms of severity and likelihood. The attendees then focused on the mitigation strategy.

They confirmed the updated goals for the plan:

- Reduce hazard-related threats to life, safety, and public health.
- Strengthen critical infrastructure and key facilities to better withstand the effects of hazards and threats.
- Enhance preparedness and response capacity while addressing the specific needs of the community.
- Align priorities across departments, agencies, and private entities for coordinated efforts toward a sustainable and resilient community.

Mitigation Strategy Activity

The attendees spent a majority of the meeting time reviewing and discussing the potential actions that were developed based on previous meetings and interview conversations. They worked in table groups to fill out worksheets requesting information related to each action. The information collected included: specific projects, which agencies/departments would be involved, potential barriers, and other plans that support or conflict with the action. The worksheets were collected by the planning team to review and use for plan development.

- City utility infrastructure improvements (water, wastewater, storm water) - 15

- Local planning and regulation efforts - 8
- Public education and outreach efforts - 11
- Improving economic resiliency - 6
- Facility improvements - 5
- Studies on hazards and mitigation projects - 5

What qualities or features in Marysville do you most appreciate?

Positive Feedback


- **Community Feel:** Friendly, small-town, hometown feel with people who care.
- **Leadership:** Appreciation for the mayor, city council, and staff — seen as responsive, courteous, and fiscally responsible.
- **Partnerships:** Recognition of partnerships with the Tutalip Tribe, watershed protection, and estuary restoration.
- **Parks & Recreation:** Walking/biking trails, community center, and recreational opportunities are highly valued.
- **Accessibility:** Easy access to services, shopping, dining, and public transportation.
- **Community Spirit:** Strong sense of livability, volunteerism, and neighbors helping neighbors.

Concerns


- **Growth & Development:** Concerns about rapid housing density, loss of small-town qualities, and diminished "redefining qualities."
- **Traffic & Noise:** Traffic congestion, noise pollution, and lack of enforcement of noise ordinances.
- **Uneven Investment:** Perception that city improvements focus on the north and south ends, neglecting central Marysville (around 88th).
- **Quality of Life Decline:** Some long-term residents feel the city has declined compared to its past livability.
